# There are better sites for quarry'

OXFORDSHIRE does not need a new quarry - that's the simple message from campaigners as the proposal is set to undergo further consultation.

Plans for a sand and gravel quarry near Clifton Hampden have been met with numerous objections and been subject to several alterations.

Developer Hills is now asking for views from the public on more changes, which include the removal of a concrete plant.

 $But\ campaign\ group\ BACHPORT-$ Burcot and Clifton Hampden for the protection of the River Thames - says

it still strongly objects to the plans. It said: "The quarry will have an unacceptable impact on a beautiful section of the River Thames within the Oxford Green Belt. It will increase traffic on roads that are already heavily overloaded. Better alternative sites with limited impact on the landscape, and with better access to the road network are available.'

The group maintains South Oxfordshire District Council is also strongly objecting, and has safeguarded a substantial part of the site for a new road and river crossing linking Didcot to Oxford.

It added: "[We] note that the concrete

plant has been removed in the most recent consultation proposals. But the fact that the proposed area for the plant site remains on the plans suggests the applicant intends to get around green belt restrictions and reinstate the plant at some point in the future.

"Oxfordshire does not need a new quarry.'

The group has previously raised concerns over loss of agricultural land, visually intrusive plans, the removal of trees and species-rich hedgerow, as well as fears over traffic through Abingdon and the A415 through the village.

Long Wittenham Parish Council

has also previously objected to the proposals. In April, members agreed the quarry would have a serious impact on the local environment and the quality of life of hundreds of residents for many years to come.

A spokesperson for Hills said: "All points of concerns raised by the planning authority and statutory consultees in relation to our application have now been addressed and we look forward to confirmation on when it will be considered by the county's planning committee.'
